Top Non-Fiction

Walter Tull's Scrapbook

Author: Michaela Morgan

Age: 8+



Born in Kent, Walter Tull (28 April 1888 - 25 March 1918) became one of Tottenham Hotspurs' top players. When he joined the Footballers' Battalion during the First World War, his leadership and courage won him a commission and a recommendation for the Military Cross. But Walter wasn't just a great footballer and British officer. He happened to be black, at a time when the rule book stated that only white men could become officers.



In personal jottings, photos and pictures, this scrapbook brings alive a man who lived outside the limitations of his

age—from Walter's childhood in an orphanage through his footballing years at Spurs and Northampton to the Western Front, highlighting the Christmas Day Truce of 1914, Walter's officer training - pipe, moustache and all! - ending with his death on the Somme, his memorials and his legacy.

Top Book (Y5&6)

Loki

Author: Louie Stowell

Age: 9+



Wry, witty and very funny diary-style story packed with doodles and comic strips about the frustration trickster god Loki feels at having to live trapped in the body of a weedy eleven-year-old boy. After one trick too many, Loki is banished to live on Earth as a "normal" school boy. Forbidden from using his AWESOME godly powers, Loki must show moral improvement. It soon becomes clear that Loki hasn't a clue how to tell good from evil, trust from tricks, or friends from enemies.

Top Book (Y3&4)

Bad Guys

Author: Aaron Blabey

Age: 7+

Pupils — Share Your **Recommendations!**

Writing book reviews helps other readers decide if they want to read the book for themselves.

Why not share a review of a book you've recently read and tell others what you thought of it?

What to do with your reviews:

1. You can email your reviews to: library@parkgatejm.herts.sch.uk

2. Leave a review in google classroom

3. Write a review or give stars out of 5 (5 being fantastic!) on a sticky note and put it up in your classroom reading area or the library.

4. Log on to Libresoft library system and add your review there. Login details are on the wall by the library computers.

We will add some of the reviews here in Reading News and display the rest in the library and in your classroom.

Reviews can include the following information:

- Title
- Author
- Illustrator (if any)
- Is it Fiction, Non-Fiction, Picture Book, Poetry, Graphic Novel, etc?
- Recommended age
- Brief summary of the book (but not giving away any spoilers or endings!)
- Main character(s)
- Strengths and weaknesses of the book
- A rating (sometimes stars) or recommendation.

Think about...

- The language and vocabulary used.
- If there are illustrations or photos, what are they like and how do they complement the book?
- What type of genre or subject is it about (humour, mysteries, animals, etc)?
